Concerning the Word of Life

What is your favorite passage in the Bible and why? Mine is 1 John 1:1-4, which reads; *“That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we looked upon and have touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— 2 the life was made manifest, and we have seen it, and testify to it and proclaim to you the eternal life, which was with the Father and was made manifest to us— 3 that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. 4 And we are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.”*

There are three reasons why 1 John 1:1-4 is my favorite passage of the Bible. The first reason is that it anchors our salvation in the historical events of Jesus’ life, death, and resurrection. One of the significant errors that Christians repeatedly make because of pride is to anchor their salvation into having the right knowledge or purity of doctrine. To be clear, yes, theology is very important, for it serves as a type of guardrail for our faith. And, as I understand what Paul is saying in Romans 10, there is a necessary knowledge of the Gospel if a person is to believe in the Gospel. Having a salvific knowledge and a good theology is extremely important. Yet, a person is not saved by what he or she knows, nor on how perfect one’s theology may be, but rather salvation is the work of God through Jesus Christ. This is why I like 1 John 1:1-4, for it anchors me in the historical event of Jesus. John, the writer, gives testimony to history. He is not proclaiming a philosophy or preaching a way of life but is

testifying to things that his eyes have seen, and his hands have handled. He is telling us that something in history (Jesus!), has happened by which we now have eternal life.

The second reason that 1 John 1:1-4 is important to me is that it describes our salvation in terms of fellowship, fellowship with God, and fellowship with each other. Notice again vs. 3, *“that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ.”* The work of Jesus Christ (the Word of Life) is both the means and source of our

fellowship with the Lord and our fellowship together. This fellowship rooted in Christ is

the sweetest fellowship one could know. John adds in verse 4, *“we are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.”* This leads to the third reason I love 1 John 1:1-4; it communicates to me how I may have complete joy.

Complete joy is found in fellowship with the Lord and with each other, a fellowship anchored in the historical life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

My prayer for you is that you may have this fellowship and so have complete joy.

Where do you find this fellowship? The only place where you can discover the historical message of Jesus and the fellowship of the saints is the church. If you are a part of New Baptist Church and have not been attending due to the virus, we miss you, and our joy is not complete without you. I invite you to start making your return to church. If you are a part of a different church, it is time to plan your return to the larger fellowship. If you are not a part of any church, please know that there is a place for you in the family of God.

He taught me about being a good churchman. He taught me to love life and to laugh. He taught me how to be a husband and father. He taught me to love Jesus first. I will visit his grave and thank him again for who he was and still is in my life. It was in October 2019 that my mom joined Daddy in heaven, and what a reunion that must have been.

I also think of my dad's humor. It was dry and would catch me off guard so often. I think if he could have chosen he would have chosen to die on Resurrection Sunday (Easter) but that was not the case. He did die on a Sunday, though, in 1984, April Fools Day. It just seemed sort of appropriate. Please excuse my ramblings here but know it is good to remember and to thank the Lord for the impact He made in my life.

On April 8, Becky and I will be celebrating our 43rd anniversary. I thank the Lord for Becky each day. He knew just whom I needed and I am better because of her.

The Covid pandemic has certainly made the past year challenging. I hope that we are turning the corner with the vaccine and will soon be able to meet together and enjoy our fellowship once again. It is so good to see folks coming out again after they have been fully vaccinated. Their smiles are from ear to ear as they enter the church. What a joy it is to see folks again. We cannot though let our guards down and see a spike in infections. So, for the time being we will still be wearing masks, sitting physically distanced, and bumping elbows rather than shaking hands. But know this, the day is coming when we can fully fellowship again.

We, as a staff, are looking forward to getting back to a full schedule of activities and services. We will when it is prudent and safe to do so.

Noticing God

Thinking about the past month we have experienced ice storms and flooding, not to mention still dealing with a pandemic, but there is hope. In just 4 weeks we have transitioned from cold and ice to sun and flower blooms. Through the season of Lent we have been focused on noticing God with the youth group. This week we looked at simplifying. Jesus teaches in Matthew 6 that we shouldn't be worried about clothes and food and material things because God provides for our needs. When we recognize this, letting go of our chasing after things, we can simply notice God and seek first His kingdom. A couple times in that story Jesus says "look" or "see" the things and nature and in this we recognize God working.

In the same way, spring is a season when we can look and notice that the brown things begin to turn green, that the dull becomes bright with new life. Thinking about Easter, the darkness and sadness of the cross makes way for a new resurrected life when the tomb stone is rolled away and Jesus walks out. What a great reminder and opportunity for us to talk about new life and resurrection as we look and notice signs of new life this spring. I'd encourage you to point these out and ask your kids where they see God? What does new life look like? Take time to discuss the sadness of the cross and the importance of Jesus taking the punishment for sin, but the joy that he has conquered death and offers a gift of new life, resurrected life to everyone who trusts him!

We have hope that April will bring new opportunities for families, children, and youth to meet on Wednesday evenings and will communicate what that will look like after Easter on Facebook and our website. We will have a **Good Friday service** where families can celebrate communion together on **April 2** and then will have a **Sunrise service at 7am** and **Easter Worship at 9 or 11am**.


For youth, we are planning a **Guyandotte Association Broomball Night** at New Baptist on **April 16**. Time and details will follow. My prayer is that you and your family will find joy in this season as the God of resurrected life makes himself known to you through the death and resurrection of Jesus. I pray that the budding of flowers, chirping of birds, and warmth of sunshine allows you to notice the God who provides life working in and around you!

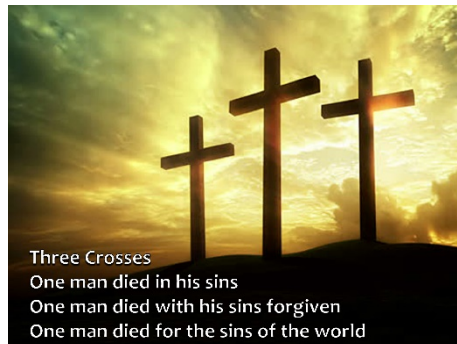

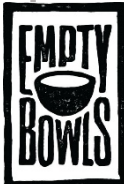

Death in Church Family

Mary Clifton, 91, of Huntington WV, passed away on Sunday, March 14, 2021. Mary was a long time member of Beverly Hills Baptist Church and a charter member of New Baptist. Mary is survived by a son, Kelly Clifton.

Short and sweet

Nineteenth-century pastor Charles Haddon (C.H.) Spurgeon was known as the “prince of preachers.” He founded a seminary in London, now named Spurgeon’s College, and taught young pastors-in-training how to prepare sermons.

Spurgeon often gave students a Scripture text and then had them deliver extemporaneous sermons. One afternoon, he assigned Luke 19:1-10 to the shortest class member.

The student immediately stood up and said, “Mr. President and brethren, my subject is Zacchaeus, and it is therefore most appropriate to me. First, Zacchaeus was little of stature, as am I. Second, Zacchaeus was up a tree; so am I. Third, Zacchaeus made haste to come down; so will I.”

When the young man sat down, his classmates urged him to continue. But Spurgeon loved the sermon, saying, “No, he could not add anything to such a perfect little speech without spoiling it.”

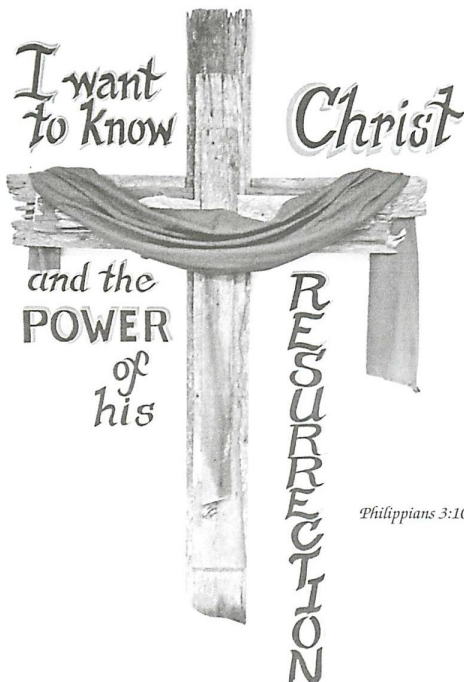
