

## Stand in Awe

Have you ever been in awe of something? To me, being in awe is when I see or experience

something so wonderful that I cannot grasp its beauty or significance with my mind. During the previous month, I had the opportunity to travel to Israel and Jordan. It was a wonderful trip filled with new learning and insight. At times, I was so overwhelmed by what I saw that my mind struggled to grasp it; I was in awe. The best example of this experience of awe was when we visited Petra, an amazing

desert city. Though I had seen pictures of it in the past, to see it in person went beyond all expectations. I kept thinking to myself, "How can I grasp this? How can I understand this?" The structures were so grand, amazing, and beautiful that no picture could fully capture Petra's majesty, and no words could describe it. I hope you may have an opportunity to see it someday.

Similarly, I am in awe when thinking about the death and resurrection of Jesus. Jesus' historical death and resurrection are beyond my mind to grasp; thus, all I can do is stand in awe. Do you realize the beauty, significance, and horror of what took place on Calvary? Can you even begin to grasp what Christ accomplished for us? I cannot. It is beyond me. My mind cannot take it in. I am in awe of Him. Through dying, Jesus destroyed death. His Resurrection is the ultimate triumph of God's love and forgiveness over sin. And because He defeated death, there is nothing in this world or in our lives that has the power to overshadow our hope. Nothing. Try to grasp that with your mind. And because of His great love for us, He has opened a new and living way for us to live abundant and eternal lives. Do we (do you) actually know what that means? These things are too wonderful for me.



In Psalm 33, the writer feels this same way about the power of God's Word. He says, "For the word of the LORD is upright, and all his work is done in faithfulness. He loves righteousness and justice; the earth is full of the steadfast love of the LORD. By the word of the LORD, the heavens were made, and by the breath of his mouth all their host. He gathers the

waters of the sea as a heap; he puts the deeps in storehouses. Let all the earth fear the LORD; let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of him (Psalm 33:4-8)!"

I believe that the instruction given in Psalm 33 regarding the Word of God (stand in awe of Him) is also an instruction to how we are to respond to what Christ has done for us; *"stand in awe of Him."* 

April is the month that we remember and celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus. Please do not take it for granted. Please do not close your eyes to its beauty (and horror). Do not treat Holy week as just another week and resurrection Sunday as just another Sunday. Take advantage of the wonder of the moment; Stand in awe of Him. Use this season of the resurrection to deepen your faith and grow in your wonder of the Lord.




### Preparing for Resurrection Day

Each year on Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, we are encouraged to focus our lives on preparing for the events of Holy Week. This year's preparation took on a whole new depth as I walked where Jesus walked but also as we visited the sites where so many important events in Scripture happened. We visited Mt. Nebo and Mt. Carmel, the area where John the Baptist ministered and was beheaded. We also went to the site where John baptized Jesus (on the Jordanian side of the Jordan river). A number of our group were baptized at that primitive site. It was quite different than the more commercialized sites in Israel. We spent time around the Sea of Galilee and the Dead Sea, places where Jesus walked and taught his disciples. The climax of the trip was the Mount of Olives, Garden of Gethsemane, and the Garden Tomb. There was so much more to be shared.

As I thought about Resurrection Day standing in line at the Garden Tomb to go inside, I wondered to myself, "Why go in? You know He is not there for he has risen just as he said."

Many friends that have been to the Holy Land come back with this explanation, "When I read the Bible before it was in black and white and now having been there it is reading in technicolor. If you have not visited the Holy Land and have the opportunity, I encourage you to do so.





If Easter means anything to modern man, it means that eternal truth is eternal. You may nail it to the tree, wrap it up in grave clothes and seal it in a tomb. But truth crushed to earth shall rise again.

Truth does not perish. It cannot be destroyed. It may be distorted. It has been silenced temporarily. It has been compelled to carry its cross to Calvary's brow ... but with an inevitable certainty, after every Black Friday dawns truth's Easter morn.




#### Lily's Place Dinners:


