

It is Time to Go Back to School

August is the month that people return to school. For some (mostly parents), this is a joyous occasion. For others (mostly students and teachers), it is the end of summer's freedom. I am grateful that we have public education, affordable colleges, and trade schools for those who want to gain further knowledge and skills after high school. Learning is good. And this is not just me saying it; the Bible tells

us as well. Proverbs 23:23 reads, "Buy truth, and do not sell it; buy wisdom, instruction, a n d understanding." This instruction is given to us again in Proverbs 18:15, "An intelligent heart acquires knowledge, and the ear of the wise seeks knowledge." Learning is good because it leads to knowledge, understanding, and wisdom.

Unfortunately, many people cease to learn once formal education has ended. This ceasing to learn is one of the problems that the writer of Hebrews addresses in his letter to the church. He says to them in Hebrews 5:11-12, "About this we have much to say, and it is hard to explain, since you have become dull of hearing. For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic principles of the oracles of God." Not only has this church stopped learning, but it has also begun to forget.

This forgetting reminds me of the parable that Jesus tells in Matthew 25 about the master giving talents to his servants before going on a journey. A talent was a unit of measure that equaled about 100 pounds. Thus, if the talents given to the servants were in gold, one talent would be equivalent to 2

million dollars today. The parable, as told by Jesus, has one servant receiving five talents (10 million dollars), another two talents (4 million dollars), and the last servant receiving one talent (2 million dollars). The two servants that received the greater amounts doubled the value of what they were given, but the one that received only the one talent did nothing with it, choosing instead to bury it in the ground. When the master returned, he took the unfaithful servant's talent away and gave it to



the one who now had ten; saying, "For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance. But from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away (Matthew 25:29)." We usually interpret the talents in this parable to be TALENTS; various gifts and skills the Lord has given us. But based upon Hebrews 5, as quoted above, I would like you to think

of these talents given by the Master as the knowledge of God. The knowledge of God is the real treasure, as we are told in places like Proverbs 8:10-11, Psalm 73:25, or Psalms 119:72, which reads, "The law of your mouth (your Word) is better to me than thousands of gold and silver pieces." What are you doing with the knowledge of God that He has given to you? Are you growing it, or are you forgetting?

The last instructions that the apostle Peter wrote were for Christians (us) to never stop learning. He says this in the last verse of 2 Peter, which reads, "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. Amen (2 Peter 3:18)." His words remind us that we are never to stop learning. Thus, as our children return to school this month, renew your passion for growing in the knowledge of our Lord.

This is an exciting transition time! As parents, this is a great time to be having lots of extra conversations with your kids about the upcoming school year and what they have learned in the past. I'm reminded of the Israelites in the first chapter of Deuteronomy. They have

been rescued from slavery and received the law, but God tells them, you've stayed here long enough, it's time to get moving toward the place I've prepared for you. (Lee's Paraphrase of 1:6-8) I feel somewhat like that in the summer; it's fun for a season, but we can't stay on vacation or at camp or on trips forever; it's time to move into a different season that God has prepared for us. Deuteronomy goes on to remind them of the law and God's faithfulness along the journey and encourage them to seek God first as they enter the promised land.

Notes From Choir Director, Karen Dailey

The choir will be singing August 7th for Communion Sunday. After that we will be getting started back with choir rehearsals every week on Wednesday nights at 7:30pm starting August 24th. This is the PERFECT time for you to be praying about joining the choir. We are a family that worships together, prays together, laughs and yes, we sing together!



If you feel led to sing in our choir, please feel free to reach out to me or any of the other choir members. We would love to have a conversation with you about joining us.

Have you ever heard of composer Ralph Carmichael? He is known as "The Father of Contemporary Christian Music". He was born the son of a preacher and thought that would also be his life's work, but God had other ways in mind for him to spread the Gospel. At 17 he enrolled in Southern California Bible College to study for the ministry. While there he was instrumental in starting a men's quartet as well as ensembles and mixed groups that blended jazz and classical music techniques with gospel songs and hymns. This exploration of blending styles began a new era of Christian music. His bands were often unwelcomed at many churches, and he wasn't allowed to store his baritone saxophone on the school campus because of its associations with big band music. One pastor even stopped his band mid-song because the music sounded too "worldly." And yet Carmichael pressed on and performed at a men's fellowship which resulted in being asked to audition for television. That TV program drew so much positive response from Christians that the station asked for more shows. He went on to score a film for the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association. His talent for composing and playing continued to be recognized by many in both secular entertainment as well as with Christian artists. He started a recording studio in order to widen the audience for the music of the "Jesus People." His autobiography is entitled "He's Everything to Me", because he wanted the title to reflect his testimony. Because of Ralph Carmichael's contributions to Christian music, we have such songs as Reach Out to Jesus and The Savior is Waiting. He was asked to write a hymn to be used at evangelistic services. Revelation 3:20 begins "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock..." He took that verse and composed these words:



The Savior is waiting to enter your heart; Why don't you let Him come in? There's nothing in this world to keep you apart; What is your answer to Him? If you'll take one step toward the Savior, you'll find His arms open wide. Receive Him and all of your darkness will end, within your heart He'll abide. Time after time He has waited before, and now He is waiting again To see if you're willing to open the door; oh, how He wants to come in.

- 1. Being basically immobile for 87 days so far is for the birds, but not for Robins.
- 2. Physical Therapy both feels good and hurts so bad.
- 3. It feels good to walk even in a leg brace and with a foot that feels like it is asleep.
- 4. Great medical care is priceless and worth every cent.
- 5. Having a wife that loves and cares for you is not to be taken for granted

On a more serious note:

- 1. There are no routine surgeries or recoveries.
- 2. The prayers of family and friends are felt and effective.
- 3. Recovery takes longer than I want.
- 4. The love and support of my church family is almost overwhelming.
- 5. If I have sometimes made you think your surgery and recovery was less serious or difficult than it was in reality? I apologize.

I want to thank you for your love and support. Your prayers are greatly appreciated. I also want to thank you for allowing me the time it takes to recover fully. This church family has always demonstrated great care and love for the staff and their families.

You may not know but you are an example for other congregations. Not every church staff receives the kind of care you give to our staff. Your example will show other congregations how they can and should care for their pastors and staff.

Thanks again for loving and caring for me. I look forward to making a difference in this community with you for Jesus.

"Give me two reasons why you don't want to go," she said.


"Well," he complained, "the kids don't like me, and neither do the teachers!"


