### "A Light Shines in the Darkness"

In the year 722 BC the Northern Kingdom of Israel falls to the Assyrians. It is hard to locate the exact moment Israel falls in the book of Isaiah. In Isaiah 7, we read about how Peka (the King of Israel) and Rezin (the King of Syria) attack Jerusalem Judah and Jerusalem withstand the attack, after which Isaiah prophesies that within the time from a woman conceiving and bearing a son to the time that that son knows how to refuse evil and choose good, the two kingdoms of Syria and Israel will be destroyed. They are destroyed in 722 BC. Isaiah 8 seems to be written on the eve of battle, with the Assyrians approaching Israel (Samaria). The last verse of chapter 8 reads "And they will look to the earth, but behold, distress and darkness, the gloom of anguish. And they will be thrust into thick

darkness ((Isaiah 8:22)."

**ISAIAH** What would you expect to read next in Isaiah? Description of the siege and then battle? The horrible things that the Assyrians do? Maybe a prayer of grief and lamentation for the fall of Israel and the destruction of 10 tribes? These expectations are reasonable expectations, but if you turn to chapter 9 you see not oracles of grief, but rather a promised future. Isaiah 9 starts out by saying - "1 But there will be no gloom for her who was in anguish. In the former time he brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he has made glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations. 2 The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone..., 6 For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his

name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace!"

At a time of great "distress, darkness, gloom and anguish" a promise is given of a great light. The promise is of a child born who will be the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords. The land of Zebulun and Naphtali were areas especially ravished by the Assyrians. It was where the darkness was the darkest. It is also the land where Jesus grew up (Nazareth is on the border between Zebulun and Naphtali) and where He did the majority of His ministry (Naphtali). Indeed, blessed are the people of Zebulun and Naphtali, for it is is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder. And they who witnessed Jesus, the His name will be called Mighty God who loved, taught, healed, forgave and redeemed.

The great promise of Isaiah 9 came at a time of the deepest despair and darkness.

Historically, this promise pointed to and was fulfilled by

the Messiah, Jesus our Lord. Yet this great promise of Isaiah 9 is not only a promise of the past already fulfilled, it is also a promise of the present in how God works in your life. You may be in a place of great "distress, darkness, gloom and anguish" thinking that the Lord has forgotten you. He has not. In fact, it is in that place – your own land of Zebulun and Naphtali - that the Lord will appear loving, healing, forgiving and redeeming. His light shall shine into your darkness bringing you peace as you trust in Him. As you celebrate Christmas this year, see the fulfillment of scripture as the everyday presence of God stepping into your life for His Glory.

#### **Mission Reports:**

**Fall Festival:** Thanks to everyone who helped make Fall Festival 2018 successful. We welcomed over 700 guests into our church and with our over 100 volunteers we had a packed house. That means that over 700 people heard the story of Christ from creation to the resurrection. Over 700 people interacted with our smiling church members during games, inflatables, face-painting and food servers. Thanks to everyone who helped in any way! We couldn't do it without everyone! During registration, our guests were asked if there was anything they were needing prayer for. We have information cards for those that answered yes. If you are willing to commit to pray for one of our guests over the next year, please see Myra Lydick.

**Marcum Terrace:** A big thank you to everyone who volunteered at Marcum Terrace Thanksgiving Dinner last week. It was blessing for everyone involved. The children enjoyed playing games and receiving coats, hats and gloves. The adults won prizes as well. Everyone was greeted with a smile and served a warm dinner. We have so much to be thankful for and it is a joy to serve others!

**MU Thanksgiving Dinner:** On November 20, a few NBC members teamed up with Pea Ridge Baptist Church members to donate desserts for Marshall University students who were not able to go home for break and the MU evening staff. Dinner was served at the Campus Christian Center and served over 200 individuals. Thanks to everyone who made desserts!





**Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes:** As a church we collected 219 shoeboxes!!! Fifty of those were made by our AWANA students. What a privilege it is to watch all ages become involved in missions! These are more than just a shoebox. It is giving the gospel to children all over the world.

**Food Pantry:** In the month of September our food pantry was able to serve 263 families totaling 598 people (199 children, 303 adults,96 seniors) and 36 homeless. They were also able to distribute 7 hygiene kits. In addition, 240 backpacks went to students at Highlawn Elementary.

#### **Service Opportunities:**

**BCM Alongsiders Ministry:** There are many members of BCM looking for someone to adopt them during their college years. They simply want to connect with a fellow believer in our city. Do you have difficulty thinking of gift ideas for everyone at Christmas? Let me introduce you to some alternate gift ideas that make a lasting impact. Instead of going to your local store to hopefully be inspired get them a gift that makes a drastic impact to families across the globe. World Vision, Samaritan's Purse and Heifer International are a few ministries that provide these alternatives. Each ministry has their own to paying for schooling for a child to providing clean water by buying a well. For example, you can purchase a pig, which can provide up to 16 piglets a year that can then be eaten or sold for profit and the manure boosts crop productivity. Kurt Kaiser Passes Away, But His Music Will Pass It On

Composer Kurt Kaiser, whose songs "Pass it On" and "Oh How He Loves You and Me" became staples at Christian camp sing-alongs and youth revivals, died Monday, Nov. 12. The 83-year-old musician wrote more than 300 copyrighted tunes, released over a dozen albums of his own, and accompanied George Beverley Shea on piano during Billy Graham's crusades.

During his career, he worked with many popular singers ranging from Mahalia Jackson to Wayne Newton. Kaiser and Ralph Carmichael—known as the father of contemporary Christian music—brought a pop sensibility to worship music for the sake of evangelism. Together, they "convinced evangelicals and fundamentalists that Christian pop music could draw youth to outreach events and revivals," including through their 1969 musical "Tell It Like It Is," which sold half a million copies worldwide. Kaiser was in awe of how popular his music had become. He once shared how struck he was to hear "Pass It On" being sung at the Cotton Bowl one year, and remarked "Isn't it amazing what will happen when you allow God to use your gifts?".

#### Why Give Back to God? (reprinted from article by Community Christian Church)

Giving our tithes and offerings reflects a grateful heart that wants to give back to God a portion of what He has given us; in reality, what is already His. This is our opportunity to show God that He is first in our lives. The Bible says, the purpose of tithing is to teach you always to put God first in your lives (Deuteronomy 14:23 TLB). Tithing is a reminder that God is the supplier of everything we have. It is also God's personal invitation to an outpouring of his blessing in your life.

#### Four reasons to give back to God

#### Giving is a Reflection of the Heart:

Matthew 6:20-21 "Store up for yourselves treasures in heaven... For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

What's the most important thing to you? We see the way our culture encourages us to store up treasures on earth and exalts materialism to the point where debt has become acceptable. We can probably even recognize that truth by looking at our own checkbooks. As Christ-followers, however, we are called to free ourselves from the bondage of debt so that our resources are available for His purposes.

#### • Giving is a Reflection of Priorities:

Long before tithing was a practice of the Israelite people, Cain and Abel, the 2nd generation of the human race, brought an offering to the Lord. Abel brought the "firstborn of his flock," while Cain brought "some of the fruits of the soil." The Lord blessed Abel's offering, but rejected Cain's. God wants to be first in our lives.

Deuteronomy 26:1-2 "When you have entered the land the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance and have taken possession of it and settled in it, take some of the firstfruits of all that you produce from the soil of the land and present them to the LORD your God." (NIV)

#### Giving is a Privilege:

The 1st Century church modeled for us what it means to give generously and joyfully so that more and more people could find their way back to God.

2 Corinthians 8:2-4 "Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints." (NIV)

#### • Giving is a Blessing:

God uses the tithe as an investment where everyone involved gets a return. If we are blessed beyond our needs, it is not for the purpose of living more lavishly but to bless others. The church and the kingdom are blessed, and yet God's nature is to also bless the giver.

Malachi 3:10 "'Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this,' says the LORD Almighty, 'and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." (NIV)
