May the Lord Direct Your Heart To His Love

Have you ever noticed the prayers that are prayed for God's people in the Bible? In both the Old and New Testaments,

prayers are voiced for the people of God. Some examples include Jacob praying blessings for his children, Moses praying for forgiveness for the Israelites, Gideon praying for guidance, Solomon for wisdom, Hezekiah for deliverance, Jehoshaphat for victory, Daniel for the fulfillment of prophecy, and most notably Jesus' prayer for his church. The Bible is full of prayers prayed for God's people. One person who prays a lot for the people of God is Paul the apostle. His prayers are not long or elaborate, often only one or two verses long, and

are found scattered throughout his letters. in his short prayers, there are some of the most profound, hopeful, and powerful prayers of the Bible. Paul is also not afraid to ask God's people (the church) to pray for him as we see in 2 Thessalonians 3:1-3, which reads, "Finally, brothers, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may speed ahead and be honored, as happened among you, and that we may be delivered from wicked and evil men. For not all have faith. But the Lord is faithful. He will establish you and guard you against the evil one." Paul then utters a short prayer for the people of Thessalonica; his one verse prayer is simply, "May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ (1 Thessalonians 3:5)."

After reading this prayer, I had to stop, ponder, and be encouraged by what Paul is

praying. He is praying that the Lord himself directs the hearts of the people into the love and faithfulness of God.

Imagine visiting a foreign country and having reservations at a very nice After arriving in the foreign country by plane, you step outside of the airport, and you are overwhelmed by all the different people trying to get you into their taxi or to go with them. You feel lost, unsure of what to do, and a little afraid. But then, up steps a gentleman holding a sign with your name on it. He says to you, "I have been waiting for you, will you please come with me. I will take you directly to your hotel." And so, this gentleman leads you to a car where he too enters in and brings you directly to your destination. From the car, he guides you into the hotel, and it is

then that you learn that your guide from the airport is also this amazing hotel's owner. The owner himself guided you to his home.

This is what Paul is praying when he says, "May the Lord himself direct your hearts...." Paul is asking the Lord to be your guide that steers you directly upon straight paths into divine love." This is a prayer that we need today. I feel that our hearts are overwhelmed with weariness and fear over so many friends that have covid or other family emergencies. I feel that many are discouraged by the overwhelming voices of news and social media. I feel that many are lost, not Thus, my prayer for you is, sure where to go. "May the Lord Himself direct your heart to Himself. May the Lord himself steer your heart into His love. Amen."

I am often reminded by a Facebook friend that "It's the little things..." These little things make a big difference in our lives for either good or bad. I recently read the following story and I thought it important enough share with you.

Bobby Leach achieved fame and fortune when in July 1911, at the age of 53, he went over Niagara Falls in a barrel. After recuperating from his injuries, Bobby toured North America and the UK with the historic barrel in tow, recounting the experience for enthusiastic audiences in circus tents and lecture halls. Leach had been a lifelong circus performer, so daredevil stunts were nothing new to him. Even into his sixties he was attempting crazy things, such as swimming across whirlpool rapids. He was prepared for the big challenges in his adventurous life.

So how did he die? He was the victim of a banana peel. No kidding. He slipped on it, injuring his leg. The leg became infected, leading to gangrene, requiring an amputation, but it was too late. He died within a couple of months. It was a little thing that got him.

Here is the moral of the story. Is it strange that the man who could survive Niagara Falls in a barrel couldn't survive a banana peel? Actually, no. More often than not, it's the little things that beat us. It's because they catch us off guard. When you know you're going over the falls in a barrel, you're fully prepared and prayed up. Something as mundane as walking down the street, even a street littered with discarded fruit, you're likely to think you've got it handled. That's when we're likely to slip. The apostle Paul said, *Therefore, let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall* (1 Corinthians 10:12). I wonder how that banana peel got to Mr. Leach. Did he see it and think that the mere skin of a fruit couldn't hurt him? Or was he simply not paying attention? Either way, the mistake proved fatal.

Think about the banana peels you encounter throughout the day. A missed devotional. A half-hearted effort at work. Spending without thinking. Carelessness in conversation. Neglecting those most important to you. If you're not careful, they can make you fall.

As a church we have some challenging days ahead of us. What will our church be like when we can move fully forward after covid. We are looking at some remodeling in the worship center. The Food Pantry is still feeding many families each week and more than 100 weekend backpacks of food are distributed each week. How do we best help families and individuals that are dealing with the effects of covid? These are just some challenges, and I am confident that we will be "prayed up" and ready for them. I wonder though if we will be derailed or distracted from doing and experiencing what God has for us because we did not take care of the little things. As we go through 2022 give attention to the little things that will allow us to accomplish big things for the kingdom of God.

Bring a big smile and a welcoming spirit on Sunday. Read the Bible through with us this year. Support our ministry with your presence and finances. Let us each strive to be faithful and then see just what God will do in and through us.

Worth, Texas. He served in churches in Ohio and Kentucky before he returned to West Virginia where he pastored Beverly Hills Baptist Church for 19 years. He also served as chaplain at Mildred-Mitchell Bateman Hospital and St. Mary's Medical Center. Keith had begun attending New Baptist until he was too sick to attend. He was preceded in death by his first wife, Virginia, his second wife,



Thoughts from our Family Life Pastor, Lee Boso



We don't talk about Bruno.... but maybe we should. WARNING! This may contain spoilers so if you have not seen Disney's Encanto, you may want to return after watching it, but if you don't mind or have already seen the movie or have the song now stuck in your head as an ear worm, proceed.

Amidst family scandal in the movie Encanto, Bruno uses his gift to shine light on unfortunate happenings with his family. When things have reached their limit to handle, he is cast away to make life easier on everyone else. But the reality is that he never leaves.

Often times this is the way we handle tough topics as the church or as families, it's just easier for all of us if we don't talk about them. But the reality is that even if we don't talk about them, they remain, and often times, can cause more trouble ignored than if they are brought into the open. We believe that God is light and truth and through Jesus darkness flees. We don't have to hide from sinful topics, but can trust God to shine light to reveal the truth as we seek Him. And if sin is revealed in us or others, we can trust Him to purify us from it. (see 1 John)

I have been reading recently about young people who have walked away from the church or their faith. A Sticky Faith survey found that 70% of former youth group kids had significant questions about faith while they were in high school. As you read this, you may resonate or you may feel ill equipped to answer those questions, but findings show that those exploring their faith don't need answers as much as they need the space to explore their questions.

I believe this is why Deuteronomy 6:6-9 urges parents to impress the foundations of faith (the law) on their children with consistency. This isn't always formal teaching, but discussions when you're sitting, walking (or driving), with your mouth and with what you do. Ask questions and invite your kids to ask questions about life and faith.

Throughout Israel's journey from slavery to the promised land, they set up pillars, or reminders that would spark questions from their kids to ask "why is this here?" What are those reminders or question starters for your family? What space are you making for your kids to ask questions? Even if you don't know the answer, you can say "I don't know... but let's explore this together, or ...but I do know that God knows, or God is good, or God is faithful because..."

When we don't talk about hard things, the questions don't go away, they just simmer and doubts brew. But if we allow the light of God to shine on those conversations and invite them, we trust God with the outcome and ultimately with the faith and formation of our kids.

What are the things you don't talk about? Why is that? How can you open the door to questions your kids may want to ask, but are afraid to? What visible reminders are you placing in your family's path that causes them to ask about God? Do your kids see you read your Bible or pray? Do they hear how you process difficult situations? Do they notice that God has made a difference in your life and have opportunity to hear about it? My prayer is that the light of Christ shines in your family's life and that the Bruno-like questions aren't stashed away, because even if you don't say them out loud, they are likely looping like a catchy song in your kids minds.
