Welcome to year of 2019!

About a month ago I was enjoying the beautiful hills of West Virginia. Despite the few potholes, we really do have amazing roads in our state. Our country roads wind up and down hills, through various hollers, over bridges and along creeks. If you have not gone for a country drive recently, you need to do it. This truly is an amazing and beautiful state. Often, while out riding on these country roads, I get lost. Sometimes I get on a road, thinking that it will take me east, but I end up south. There are no straight roads anywhere, and when a person does not know where each road goes, it is very easy to get on a road that takes him far from his destination. This has often happened to me. I set off for a nice country ride and once I get going on a country road, all the winding up and down hills gets me totally turned around. There have been times when I thought I was heading towards Milton that I ended up in Hamlin, or even worse, I aimed for Logan and instead landed in Williamson WV. Country roads take you home to where you belong only when you figure out the correct country road to be on. Since being lost has happened to me more than once, I have learned the importance of finding a spot to pull over, so I can check my map-app on my phone. Pausing the drive is often inconvenient but necessary to insure I am on the correct road and if I am not, to figure out what to do.

This is how I imagine each new year. When the calendar year moves a digit (from 2018 to 2019), it reminds me that it is time to pull over and check the map. Am I on the right road? Are you on the right road? Sometimes life is like a West Virginia country road. It is wild and wonderful but does not necessarily bring you to your

destination - to home.

Our world has all kinds of roads it wants you to travel on. January 2019**

Thank you for your continued support of Pastor Dasni's ministry in Ft. liberte' Haiti. With your help we were able to donate a total of \$4,774.53 this year!!! What a huge difference that makes in the life of not only Pastor Dasni but also everyone he ministers to.

Food Pantry:

Our food pantry continues to amaze me with all they serve! The backpack weekend food given to Highlawn Elementary totaled 480!

In October and November, they served 606 families totaling 1,407 people (444 children, 736 adults, 227 seniors) and 48 homeless. They were also able to distributed 127 hygiene kits.

This week they also assembled and distributed 147 Christmas dinner boxes and 13 fruit baskets to the elderly.

Haiti Medical Trip:

Several NBC members went to Haiti in October for a medical mission trip. They were able to see/treat 700 people in the clinic. They were also able to leave \$2,700 in a medical fund to continue to pay for treatment of a few patients that needed care at another facility. Your generosity continues to make this possible.



One Great Hour of Sharing:

The One Great Hour of Sharing Offering that was collected earlier this Fall received \$450 in offering and went for hurricane relief through our American Baptist Churches.

Backpack Blessings:

Our 1st, 2nd, 3rd grade Sunday school class with Teresa Foster as teacher decorated and filled 60 canisters with goodies and distributed to the backpacks at Highlawn Elementary. What a blessing to have all ages involved in Missions.



Fall festival:

This seems so long ago, but I haven't been able to report on it. We had over 100 volunteers in making this event a success. You all are amazing at welcoming our neighbors with a smile. I know everyone that came to the event left hearing God Loves You at least once. Donna Dunn made sure of that! Thank you because without all of you we could not pull off this event.

Operation Christmas Child:

As a church, we were able to collect 219 Shoeboxes to be given. That is amazing. Not only does that mean 219 kids received Christmas presents, but more importantly, they got to hear about Jesus.



Marcum Terrace:

We would love to thank everyone that volunteered at Marcum Terrace Holiday dinner. We had over 30 volunteers to serve, converse, and play with the residents. We were able to serve 187 meals. Every child that needed a coat, hat, scarf or gloves we were able to provide. We were also able to provide gifts for the adults to through a raffle. Overall everyone enjoyed the evening and it was as much a blessing to us serving as it was to them. Thanks to Alissa Stricker for catering the food.

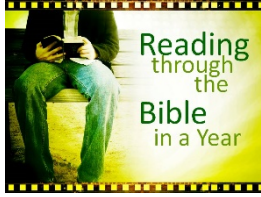

Reading the Bible through each year is a habit I began some years ago. Each year I get something new from the reading that I had not noticed before. I have used different plans and versions of the Bible to give the reading a fresh look and feel. Here are a couple of ideas that might help you as you read again this year.

- Use a new or different Bible. Often when we read from Bibles where we have marked or highlighted passages our eyes tend to go to those and we might miss what is surrounding those verses we marked before.
- Use a different plan and keep track of what you have read.
- If you are into journaling, here is a method I have used. It is called the SOAP method. After reading, choose a (S) scripture from what you have read and write it down. Then write a brief (O) observation of what is happening in the passage. Next, write an (A) application by answering this question, "How will I be different today because of what I just read. Finally write a brief (P) prayer. If you journal like this you can go back and review what the Lord has been teaching you over the course of the year.
- I know it is hard but if you miss a day just miss it and keep reading the current day's readings. Too often, when we get behind a few days we think we will never catch up so we just quit. Remember that this is a year-to-year habit you are building and my guess is that you will not miss the same day's reading next year. If your DNA won't let you move forward without catching up then set aside some time to do just that. Remember the goal is to build a habit of being continually in God's Word

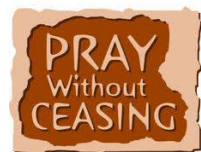
Most plans include a reading from both the Old and New Testament each day. Some of you have expressed that a method like that is frustrating and you would rather read a book at a time. It has been difficult to find a plan that does that but I did find one. If you use the Bible App from YouVersion.com the reading plan called "Canonical" takes you from Genesis straight through the Bible to Revelation in a year.

Copies of the plans for reading the Bible through in 2019 will be available at the Information Desk. Please feel free to ask me about other plans that are available.

I look forward to reading through God's Word with you this year.

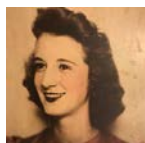

Reading resolutions

Every January, many Christians resolve to read the entire Bible in one year. That’s a worthy goal, but God doesn’t require us to read a certain number of verses or chapters per day. Instead, he tells us to simply be in his Word — and thus be with him — so he can grow our faith, light our path and assure us of his love and forgiveness. God’s Word is a precious gift, but we need to “unwrap” it!

F.B. Meyer offers this helpful advice for a new year of discovering (and rediscovering!) Scripture: “Read the Bible, not as a newspaper, but as a home letter. If a cluster of heavenly fruit hangs within reach, gather it. If a promise lies upon the page as a blank check, cash it. If a prayer is recorded, appropriate it and launch it as a feathered arrow from the bow of your desire. If an example of holiness gleams before you, ask God to do as much for you. If the truth is revealed ... entreat that its brilliance may ever irradiate ... your life.”

Fifty years ago this week, Frank Borman, James Lovell, and Bill Anders became the first men to leave Earth, orbit the moon and return to earth safely. During the Apollo 8 mission, Anders caught this photograph, titled "Earthrise". It was at this sight that the astronauts had an opportunity to broadcast back to earth on Christmas Eve. Their opening words were a reading from Genesis 1: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters.

And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." And there was evening, and there was morning—the first day.

And God said, "Let there be a vault between the waters to separate water from water." So God made the vault and separated the water under the vault from the water above it. And it was so. God called the vault "sky." And there was evening, and there was morning—the second day.

And God said, "Let the water under the sky be gathered to one place, and let dry ground appear." And it was so. God called the dry ground "land," and the gathered waters he called "seas." And God saw that it was good."

As I contemplated the power of this scenario and the proclamation of God's handiwork from men looking back at our planet from the moon I started to cry. I wanted to be an astronaut growing up, but the course of my life and career veered toward becoming a preacher. However, I wonder if these astronauts had any idea that their response to God's creation and their placement in His story would stir the hearts of people for half a century and beyond.

More than the gravitas of seeing earth from afar is the thought of how we are helping our children to have eyes that recognize God at work and the language of scripture that wells up from within, when looking at our world, whether from far away or from ground level, to proclaim God at work. I haven't found a lot about the upbringing of these three astronauts, but along their path, scripture was put in front of them at such a place that when they had a chance to see and respond to a view most of us will never experience, they responded with words from scripture.

John writes in 1 John 2:14 "I write to you, fathers, because you know him who is from the beginning. I write to you, young men, because you are strong, and the word of God abides in you, and you have overcome the evil one." What a great challenge to us who know God to help those who are young, our children, to have the Word of God living inside them, uttering responses at the sight of God and His creation the proclaim God's goodness and love.

As we start a new year, I want to encourage you to consider how God's Word is living and acting in your life. Step further into reading, studying, and memorizing it. Pass along the lessons you've learned and encourage your children to know God and His Word, you never know when as a teacher, astronaut, contractor, etc.... they will be called to preach or proclaim God's handiwork in creation and redemption of humanity.

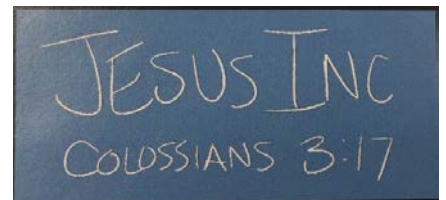
