The Habits of Perseverance

One of the interesting things that sit in my office is a vintage Russian Kirov Marine Chronometer. I purchased it years ago at an antique store in Dhaka, Bangladesh. One of the industries of Dhaka is scrapping old ships. Thus, when a vessel is to be scrapped, it is brought to the banks of the Buriganga River, and everything in it is removed and, if possible, sold. This is how I came to own a Russian Marine Clock that had once

Russian Marine Clock that had once belonged to a Russian naval warship. I purchased the clock because my imagination was grabbed by the necessity, ritual, and tradition surrounding marine clocks (Chronometer – the counting of time). Before computers, satellites, and GPS systems, a clock was necessary to determine the ship's location on the seas. With the use of a sextant, the sun's elevation would be measured (or some other star) and recorded with the exact time

given by the marine clock. Based on the set time, an accurate longitude could be given. So important were the marine chronometers that ritual was created to wind the clock. At a specific moment on each day, the entire ship's crew would be called to order, and the captain, with his first mate, would parade to the clock and wind it. This ritual was vital because it ensured the clock would not stop ticking, for if it stopped, then the time it told would no longer be accurate, and if it were no longer accurate, the ship would become lost.

I think the importance of the marine clocks and the ritual ships used to keep them running gives us a spiritual lesson. The spiritual lesson is that of perseverance. A good definition of perseverance is the old watch slogan, "it takes a licking and keeps on ticking." Throughout the New Testament, there are multiple calls to persevere coupled with warnings for those who do not. In the book of Revelation, Jesus tells the churches that those who persevere (conquer)

will not be hurt by death, will be given a new name, will be given authority, and will sit with him upon His throne. Paul writes Timothy the importance of holding faith and a good conscience (persevere), and those who do not shipwreck their faith (1 Timothy 1:19). Or in the book of Hebrews 2:1, which reads, "Therefore we must pay much closer attention to what we have heard, lest we drift away from it." Just as it is natural for a wind-up clock to wind down and stop, so too is it natural to drift away.

A quote from D.A.Carson says it well, "People do not drift toward Holiness. Apart from grace-driven effort, people do not gravitate toward godliness, prayer, obedience to Scripture, faith, and delight in the Lord. We drift toward compromise and call it tolerance; we drift toward disobedience and call it freedom; we drift toward superstition and call it faith. We cherish the indiscipline of lost self-control and call it relaxation; we slouch toward prayerlessness and delude

ourselves into thinking we have escaped legalism; we slide toward godlessness and convince ourselves we have been liberated."

How do we stop the drift, the wind-down of our souls? Hebrews 2:1 tells us, "Pay close attention to what we have heard (the Bible)." This means, for me, observing a clock-winding ritual like those carried out on ships. For the movement of my soul to tick well, I find that the habit of reading scripture is necessary, the practice of prayer is crucial, and the enjoyment of God through worship is fundamental. These are the practices required to keep me ticking despite any hardship or suffering in this life. I believe the same is true for you. Perseverance requires habits that feed the soul. As you begin this new year, recognize God's call on your life and so create the habits of perseverance.

Haiti update: Great news! There is a group (not from our church) headed to Ft Liberte after Christmas. The roads are back open and not current unrest. If everything goes smoothly that will look great for our church taking a group in the spring.

Marshall Football Team: We were able to serve lunch again to the Marshall football players wanting to be involved in the Bible study that followed. We served soup, salad, bread sticks and dessert. We fed 20 players. Praise the Lord 20 players are hearing about the Lord.

International Student Thanksgiving Dinner: Myra Lydick hosted her annual Thanksgiving dinner for international students from Marshall University. Food was provided by Myra and other New Baptist members. 11 international students were present. They not only learned about our thanksgiving traditions but also about the Gospel which we should all be thankful for. Thank you Lydick family for your heart to reach international students.

Operation Christmas Child: We collected 108 shoeboxes this year. Thanks to those of you who shopped or donated money. You are making a difference. Because of you all 108 children around the world will hear the Good News of the Gospel and have a chance to grow further with discipleship opportunities.

Becky Crouch was able to go to Charlotte, NC to one of the processing centers to help pack all the boxes before they ship out. It is a well-oiled machine according to her. They set up stations of 8-10 people. A couple people open boxes and take out the money, then the next person inspects the boxes for appropriate gifts, the next person then tapes it all back up and makes sure it is properly label, then it gets scanned and repacked into a larger box. She signed up for 6-hour work times. She would love to see us take a group from here in the future to help.

Holiday Bazaar: Our ABW group hosted the annual holiday bazaar at the beginning of December. It was very well attended. Around 20 vendors were present. The Cabell Midland Collegium Choir sang, Santa was present for pictures, crafts for kids and lunch was available. All the money made from lunch and the vendor fees goes toward our ABW missions' projects.

Food Pantry: On Sunday, the 18th, a great group of volunteers got together to fill 150 Christmas boxes with grocery items. These boxes were given out on Monday, the 19th. This was a joint venture once again with a grant from Stella Fuller.

Fall Festival: We had a wonderful day at Fall Festival in Oct. The weather was gorgeous, and we were able to welcome 200 people from our community and church family. They were able to hear 13 stories from creation through the promise of eternity in heaven. At the end of the stories guests received candy and a bagged lunch. Please continue to pray that seeds that were planted will be watered.

We had leftover candy that we have been able to distribute to multiple other ministries in our area. We gave 80 goodie bags to the residents of the Veterans Home in Barboursville, 20 goodie bags to the residents at Branches Domestic Violence Shelter, the residents of Wyngate Senior Living Center, BCM and Fellowship Baptist for their festival this coming weekend. Thanks as always for being generous in your time, money and service.

We also had more hotdogs than we're needed. Therefore, we were able to sell hotdog lunches the next morning raising \$370 to go towards the One Great Hour of Sharing hurricane relief.

Proposed 2023 Budget: With the increase of \$5,500 and the line item of Behold the Lamb of \$3,100 we increased our budget by \$8,600. Here is the breakdown.

- 1. Increase giving to Bridges International by \$2,400 (for a total of \$3,00/year)
- 2. Add missionary, Sarah McCloy, through International Ministries to Japan for a total of \$3,000
- 3. Increase giving to the Gideons by \$500 (for a total of \$1,000/year)
- 4. Add Pastor Dasnis at \$1,700/year. We will continue our lunches/cookie sales but most likely quarterly instead of monthly to make up for the rest of the giving we typically give to him.
- 5. Cabell County School Pantries at \$1,000/year. It has been brought to our attention that schools are in need of items such as underwear, socks, etc.- things they cannot purchase with Title 1 money. This line item would allow us to meet those needs when the need arises.

An Extra Mission Project - Cookies & Gospel Tracts: In December a group of volunteers made cookies to send to the inmates at the St. Mary's Correctional Center in St. Mary's WV. This was a project that we participated in along with 26th St. Baptist and Pea Ridge Baptist. Cookies were packed in quart bags (8 to a bag) and a gospel tract was added to the bag. The cookies were picked up and delivered to the correctional center by their chaplain, Timothy Meadows.

December letter from Pastor Dasni


Dear Friends and Supporters,


