The Harrowing of Hell


"Did Jesus descend into hell when he died upon the cross and his body placed in the grave?" This question prompts a very old theological debate that continues today. In the Apostles' Creed, which people believe to have been in use around 250 AD, it reads, "[Jesus] was crucified, died and was buried: he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead." The primary scriptural argument for Jesus' descent into hell is 1 Peter 4:6 which reads "For this is why the gospel was preached even to those who are dead." The

primary argument against any belief that Jesus descended into hell comes from Jesus' words to the thief on the cross, "Today you will be with me in paradise (Luke 23:43)." How can Jesus descend into hell if he is enjoying paradise with the thief?

Many esteemed preachers of the past believed that Jesus did descend into hell. Calvin taught that Jesus' descent into hell was


important doctrine, for it conveyed the true seriousness of our sin. At the time of the reformation, Martin Luther did not question this belief and is recorded as teaching it. R.C. Sproul teaches "He goes to hell to liberate those spirits who, from antiquity, have been held in prison. His task in hell then is one of triumph, liberating Old Testament saints." Yet there are many respected teachers who strongly disagree. John Piper is known to be silent when that portion of the Apostles' Creed is being recited. Augustine, the great teacher of the early church, also seemed to see the descent into hell as more of an allegory than history. Personally, I have found myself straddling the fence, sometimes leaning in one direction and then to the other side. Today though, I think I have been knocked off the fence and do believe that Jesus descended into hell

Right now, in America things are not good. At the time of writing this newsletter, it seems that we as a country are losing the fight against Covid-19. People are tired and are giving up. As a country, due to the Covid-19, we are possibly entering a prolonged economic depression. There is massive chaos in the political system and in both parties, Republican and Democrat. Racial tension and strife and social action are the highest they have been in my lifetime. And mixed into all of this is a constant push for cultural change under the language of "social justice" which to me feels more like "mob justice."



As I emotionally and spiritually struggle with what is happening in our country, one image keeps coming to my mind repeatedly. It is the image of Jesus' descent into hell

mind is of a painted wall I saw in an Orthodox Monastery in Meteora Greece. Jesus is raising hell in hell. He is breaking down walls, smashing locked doors, setting captives free, stomping on the devil, and leading a large throng of people out of bondage. It is a powerful image that says there is no place outside of God's reach and there is no corner of human suffering that the gospel can not reach. It is a message that we need to hear today. In the midst of whatever crisis we are in, God is at work, the gospel goes forth with power, and our Lord is victorious over evil, always.

The Weight of Hate

Word lovers, delight! The lexicon has tongue-twisting terms that describe hatred for just about anything.

According to *Mental Floss*, if you're a misodoctakleidist, for example, you hate practicing the piano. Misogelasts hate laughter, while misopogonists hate beards and misophonists hate certain irritating sounds. There's even a word for someone who hates hatred (in the form of war or strife): a misopolemist.

Some of these words may make us smile, yet hate is deadly serious. No matter the target, hatred weighs us down and distracts us from Godly living.

That's why Paul instructs followers of Jesus to "put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice" (Ephesians 4:31, NRSV). Once that hateful weight is gone, we'll be freed up to "be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you" (verse 32).



June is the month of graduation celebrations and I feel sorry for the Class of 2020 because much of that has been cancelled or postponed because of the Covid-19 pandemic. Recently I was looking through some old sermon files and ran across the Baccalaureate Sermon I gave to Bethany's graduating class at Wheeling Park High School. As I began that message I reflected on my own baccalaureate in June of 1966. I reflected to the students that as a student we were sitting there when an old white-haired man got up to speak – Oh my, I said, I'm that old white-haired man. I realized how removed from their culture I was. I hope I was able to share some wisdom with them even with the cultural divide.

As I reflect on the events of the recent past in our country, I am again struck by how wide the cultural divide is between my generation and younger ones. The challenge before us is how do we do ministry together in our community that makes a difference for the Lord.

Here is some food for thought for many of us. Len Sweet is a pastor and commentator on the church and modern cultural trends. He commented at a conference I attended, "if you are older than 38 you are an immigrant in the current culture". As I reflected on that I thought about immigrants. They come from the "old" country with "old" customs and thoughts. They have a work ethic and job skills vastly different from their children. It is true, those in my generation are like immigrants in the current American culture.

I confess that I struggle with what to say and how to speak faithfully to the current issues. I recognize that my thoughts and views have been shaped over the years by the culture in which I lived. I have struggled with the White Privilege/Black Lives Matter issue or debate. How do I as a follower of Jesus speak truth with love and compassion to both sides of this issue? One very helpful resource for me was a video done by Phil Vischer, the creator of Veggie Tales, titled "Race in America". This 18-minute video is well worth your time. To find it just google **Holy Post – Race in America** and it will take you to the YouTube video. This helped me with some perspective on how I need to move forward. I hope it will be helpful to you.

Back to the baccalaureate. I finished by sharing with them the three most important decisions they would make in life, their Master, Mate, and Mission. The old white-haired preacher closed with words that are timeless and cross all generations and cultures and are still true today, "Many things can teach you how to make a living but only Christ can teach you how to live."



Feeling like an immigrant in the modern culture? Me, too. We've got some work to do if we are going to make an impact for the Lord in our world. I pray you will join us as we seek to know Christ, grow in His Word and become a blessing wherever He has placed us. Just some thoughts for you to chew on as we seek to do ministry together. Let's help people learn how to really live.
