The book of Proverbs is a book of beauty. When reading this book, I like to ponder on some of its messages. The wisdom of Proverbs is very practical and thought-provoking. Over the next few months, I plan to share some of this book's wisdom with you. Let us enjoy God's Word, for it is sweet!



Proverbs 4:18-19

"18 But the path of the righteous is like the light of dawn, which shines brighter and brighter until full day. 19 The way of the wicked is like deep darkness; they do not know over what they stumble."

It was not so long ago that I drove along I64 early one morning. It was just starting to get light out, and the road was covered in fog. People drove slowly, using the white and yellow lines to guide the way. It was stressful driving, but as the sun rose higher and the fog burned off, I could drive full speed down the roadway because of the excellent visibility. Proverbs 4:18 describes the path of the righteous in much the same way. No person is born righteous; no one is naturally wise. Every person that I know makes mistakes growing up. In the words of President George W. Bush, "When I was young and foolish, I was young and foolish."

We all begin this life in a fog, not able to see two feet in front of us. Yet, the Lord has given us a way to see and interpret life. Through His Word and living in a relationship with God through faith, we

begin to learn about ourselves and others. We learn that we do not know everything, that we often get in our own way, that we can do some really awful things, and that we are in need of a savior. Likewise, through His Word, we learn that our Lord is good, full of steadfast love, and faithful to His promises. We learn that we are made by Him for Him. We learn that life is enjoyed most as we journey in this world with Him. That is what I think when I read in Proverbs 4:18 "the path of the righteous is like the light of dawn, which shines brighter and brighter until full day." As I journey with the Lord and draw closer to Him, His light shines into every area of my life, often revealing sin that the fog and darkness easily obscured. The path of the righteous is a path of growing wholeness due to the Lord's holiness.

Unfortunately, the way of the wicked does not know the light of God's holiness. They go through life pulled along by the undiscovered brokenness, sins, and hurts of their soul. When they trip and fall, their response is to not seek a revealing of their own heart that leads to healing, but rather to blame others, to be a victim, or give an excuse, and then repeat the same mistake all over again. Like the righteous, the wicked also seek to be happy, to do what is right, and to have pesonal fulfillment in life. Yet the wicked seek these things away from the giver of these things and thus never finds them. The great darkness spoken about in Proverbs 4:19 is to pursue the longings of the soul away from the light of God's goodness and holiness.

How about you? In this journey that we call life, is your day becoming brighter, or is your day trending into dusk? The Lord is good, and His light burns the fog of darkness and sin away from our lives, allowing us to live more alive in this world today. Walk close to Him.

From Our Family Life Pastor



Here we are just weeks away from the end of the school year, and looking back, I have to admit that I don't think our kids are the only ones who have learned new things this year. Can I dad-brag just for a second? OK...I will anyways. We have a new reader in our house!! Now I have to confess when the 2020/21 school year began, Carmen and I were freaking out with this virtual arrangement, not just for the scheduling and demand on parents, devices and internet bandwidth, but because we had a kindergartener, and although both of us are educated and love to read, neither of us had ever taught someone else to read. We felt vastly unprepared and knew we could not replace the careful skill of those incredible wonderful kindergarten teachers who introduce our kids to the wonders of learning and lay the foundations for reading and math that other teachers would build on for years to come. Quite frankly, I realized

how much we were dependent on the experts!

But this week as Brooks was sounding out words and even writing his own stories with spelling help from "Alexa", I realized that the skills and curriculum of the teachers was effective, but it was also dependent on the repetition in the classroom and at home, reading and repeating those little 4 word sentences that accompanied the brightly colored pictures sent home each week. This team approach between teachers and families and students has helped one pupil discover the power of words to gain information and to tell stories.

This year I have learned that the experts are important, for sure. But I've also learned that those teachers offer tools which we as parents can then use to fan the smoldering sparks into flames. The time we spend cuddling on the couch, talking before bed, and throughout our days can be used to practice those skills they are learning. There are many more years of practicing spelling words and remembering grammar rules ahead, but the foundation is laid.

This partnership with parents is not just effective with school, but also with faith. As parents we have many more hours with our kids than they spend at church. We have the opportunity to repeat the stories of God's work over and over in the lives of our family. Just as our kindergartener learned the skills to read at school and practiced at home, so can your family learn to practice their faith in God through reading scripture, prayer, and talking about how God is working in and around them. This is partnership in the community of faith, the church.

In 1 Thessalonians 2, Paul talks about his teaching, but his language is in family terms. He talks about interacting like a father, mother, and child. He says that while he was among the Thessalonians he shared not only the Gospel, but his life as well. How important this sharing of life is in sharing the Gospel with our families. As we begin summer, I'm sure your family is ready for a break from virtual assignments and having to remember to charge iPads or computers each day, but in this transition, what have you learned this year? How have you seen partnerships between home and school or home and church work well or struggle? What are you going to do about it? How can you create opportunities to share life this summer? What experiences might help you talk about the Gospel with your family? How has God rescued, made impossibilities possible, or turned death, suffering, and pain into resurrected life?

Where have you seen God work in and around you? Share these stories, and as a family practice watching for God at work in scripture and in the world around us!

We, as a church, want to continue this partnership, encouraging and equipping you for these times of sharing life and the Gospel with one another! Notes from NBC Choir Director, Karen Dailey

It has been thrilling to begin rehearsing and offering praises in song with a part of our choir! To God be the glory. We will continue rotating the singers in order to allow everyone that wants to participate an opportunity. OH! How we have missed singing together through this pandemic, but we will do everything we can to remain healthy and safe. Once we are able to return full choir will be a glorious day! What a day that will be! This reminds me of one of my favorite hymns as a youth singing of the hope and comfort we have in looking toward Heaven. In 1955, James Vaughn Hill, composer, was inspired by an orphan girl and a mother-in-law when he wrote the song "What A Day That Will Be." The orphan girl sang at his Baptist church years earlier and ended her song with a testimony of what a day that would be. Later Hill's mother-in-law became paralyzed by a stroke when she was only 50 years old. He couldn't understand why this had happened to such a wonderful woman at such an early age but upon pondering the whys of the will of God, he thought of the hope and comfort of being in Heaven. Having never written a song before, he sat down and wrote these words:

There is coming a day when no heartaches shall come, No more clouds in the sky, no more tears to dim the eye. All is peace forevermore on that happy, golden shore. What a day, glorious day that will be!

There'll be no sorrow there, no more burdens to bear, No more sickness, no pain, no more parting over there. And forever I will be with the One who died for me. What a day, glorious day that will be!

What a day that will be when my Jesus I shall see, And I look upon His face, the One who saved me by His grace! When He takes me by the hand, and leads me through the Promised Land, What a day, glorious day that will be!

He, his wife and sister-in-law sang the song for his paralyzed mother-in-law and as they sang, for the first time in three years, his mother-in-law smiled and showed signs of excitement. He believed this to be a sign that the song was blessed by God, and it has since been sung and recorded by thousands of people. *



May we all serve Christ and give praises in song until that day.


