The Arrival of Spring

With the coming of March, winter is over. Have you ever considered the historic importance of March?

· Where I grew up (Eastern Oregon), March was when the ground had thawed out from winter and was ready to be worked and planted.

· March also lines up (mostly) with the Jewish month of Nisan, the religious new year as counted from when the nation was birthed out of the Exodus.

· March 4th was considered the birthday of the United States because it is the date the US Constitution became effective.

· March 20th is when the spring equinox occurs. The equinox is when the earth's equator is aligned with the sun according to its orbit. March 20th marks the moment in the year when the Northern Hemisphere begins to receive more sun than the Southern Hemisphere.

· And, as strange as it sounds, the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox is Resurrection Sunday (Easter). This year, the first full moon (called the Paschal or Passover moon) after the Spring Equinox will occur on March 25th (a Monday). Thus, Resurrection Sunday will be celebrated on the following Sunday, March 31st, the last day of March.

I do not think it is a coincidence that Resurrection Sunday falls where it does. Historically speaking, this decision to set Resurrection Sunday on

the Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox was brilliant. Though this sounds complicated to us, it was a workable formula in a day without calendars and poor long-distance communication. When do you celebrate the resurrection? When the days start getting longer, the resurrection is celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon.



*“He put another parable before them, saying, “The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed that a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is larger than all the garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.”
(Matthew 13:31–32)*

Theologically speaking, though, Resurrection Sunday, which takes place in either late March or early April, reminds me of when I worked on farms in Eastern Oregon. In February, the ground is still frozen, and nothing can be planted, but come March, the rains have come, and the ground is soft, allowing the soil to be broken and the seed to be planted. This makes me think of Jesus's death and Him being planted (placed in the grave) at just the right time. Just as a seed must be planted in order for it to grow into a mighty tree where all the birds of the air can find shelter (Matthew 13:31-32), so too does the Son of Man need to die so that eternal life may be available to

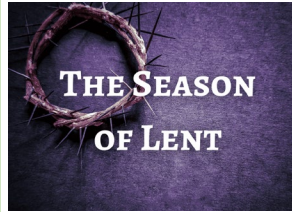
all. It is good and fitting to celebrate the Resurrection in the season when we see life budding forth from trees and fields, for creation itself points us to the new life each person can have in the Son who has defeated death.

Therefore, as we near the celebration of the Resurrection (March 31), may your heart be like a farmer's field in spring. May it be broken and stirred so that the Word of God that is planted in you may grow.

Dear Church Family and Friends,

WE NEED YOUR HELP!

On the last Sunday in February, Pastor Trent recognized the tremendous work and dedication of our more than 50 food pantry volunteers, both members of our church family and volunteers from other churches. We are so thankful and blessed by the time and effort of each volunteer, supporting those in need in our community.

In addition to the hundreds of volunteer hours, it takes thousands of dollars to purchase the food for the multitude of people being reached each week. This is where the Food Pantry needs your help.

In 2023, we averaged \$2,800 less in support per month than our expenses for food and other necessary costs. This is slowly eroding the surplus of funds we accumulated during the pandemic, when most of the other pantries stopped operating, and the Food Bank supplied a huge quantity of free food to us over a long period of time to help our food pantry fill the void left by these closings.

You can help decrease this deficit by supporting our food pantry with additional giving over and above your normal tithes to support the operations of the church.

We appreciate all that you already do to support the food pantry!

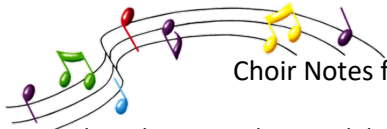

Gail was able to get in touch with Samaritans Purse who gave her urine strips, Hgb testing strips and insulin syringes for FREE for the clinic in Ft Liberte'. They were also able to fix 2 chemistry lab readers that Gail has had for years that weren't working.

Thank you for all who supported the lunch this past Sunday. You donated right at \$1600 toward project money for the upcoming trip.

Operation Christmas Child: We have set a goal to double the amount of shoeboxes this year. We plan to pack 1,000!!! To lighten the load of that each quarter we will provide you all with suggestions of items to purchase. This quarter we have asked for washcloths, toothbrushes and combs. I am happy to report that we have 1026 washcloths, 1074 combs/hairbrushes and 782 toothbrushes. So if you find toothbrushes on sale go ahead and grab some. Thank you for continuing to be so generous in your giving. Something as simple as a toothbrush can make an eternal difference!

Fun full circle moment for us. Star Canterbury is a missionary we support through Bridges International at Marshall University. She actually received as shoebox when she was a little girl in the Dominican Republic. She will be sharing with us in April about how that shoebox impacted her life. So stay tuned for more info as that time gets closer.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD UPDATE – Becky Crouch, Coordinator



You are amazing and I thank God for your generosity! During the months of January and February we have been collecting washcloths, toothbrushes and hairbrushes or combs, with the goal of giving 1000 children a shoebox gift this year. Today, as I am writing this, you have given more than 1,000 washcloths, hairbrushes/combs and toothbrushes. Thank you for sharing in the ministry of Operation Christmas Child that impacts many children, families, villages and communities!

The following is written by one who has experienced the difference made through shoebox gifts.

What a great reminder of why we are gathering these items! It makes an eternal difference!

Mangily is a village in the southwest of Madagascar, where an Anglican Church is located. Catechist Rolin is in charge of this Church. Whenever Catechist Rolin goes to Mangily, he passes by Amparehitra, a small village where Sakalava tribe live. Sakalava people practice ancestors worship and idolatry. There is no church in Amparehitra, and the 50 households and approximately 100 children had lived in total darkness. In his heart, Catechist Rolin longed to see a church opened in Amparehitra, and he always prays whenever he passes by this village.



Rolin heard about Operation Christmas Child. He was convinced that it was a way to preach the Gospel to the Sakalava children in Amparehitra. He applied for his church in Mangily and for 50 children in Amparehitra. In May 2023, they held their first Outreach event in Amparehitra where 50 children were gathered in the court of a school village and heard about Jesus for the first time. God is so great! They were so happy while receiving the giftboxes, such gifts they have never received in their life. They were so excited to do The Greatest Journey, and 42 children were enrolled. The children talked with their parents, and together they expressed their desire to the Catechist to see a church planted in this village. Now around 54 people gather weekly for prayer at the school village where 80% are children. The Sakalava in Amparehitra will no longer live in darkness. The Light has come, Immanuel, God dwelling among us!

One intriguing person in the Passion account is the thief on the cross whom Jesus promised a same-day entrance to paradise (see Luke 23:43). Pastor and radio host Alistair Begg says he can't wait to meet that man and ask how everything unfolded. "You were cussing [Jesus] out with your friend," Begg says. "You've

never been in a Bible study. You've never been baptized. You didn't know a thing about church membership, and yet you made it!"

In a sermon, Begg pictures an imaginary angel at the pearly gates, growing frustrated during the sinful thief's entrance interview. After receiving no clear answers from the thief about doctrines such as justification, the angel finally asks, "On what basis are you here?" The thief simply replies, "The man on the middle cross said I can come."
