The Strength that the Lord gives

One of my most favorite stories in the Bible is the story about the prophet Elijah that is recorded in 1 Kings 19. The land had been without water for over three years, but the drought came to an end after a powerful demonstration of the Lord's power. In 1 Kings 18 there is a story of Elijah challenging the prophets of Baal. The

challenge takes place between two sacrifices. The prophets of Baal fail have their sacrifice despite much accepted effort. Elijah, then soaks his sacrifice and all the wood in water, and simply prays to the Lord. Verse 38 says "Then the fire of the Lord fell and consumed the burnt offering and the wood and the stones and the dust, and licked up the water that was in the trench." This is one of the most extraordinary



visible displays of God's power in scripture. The passage reads, "When all the people saw this, they fell prostrate and cried, "The Lord—he is God! The Lord—he is God" (v.39).

At this point in time Elijah must have felt really good. The Lord has won, the people confess Him. Reading further in the story it only gets better. The Lord sends the rain, the prophets of Baal are rejected (and killed) by the people. Surely now, Elijah must have thought, a religious awakening will take place in the land. Surely now that the people have seen the power of God at work, they will return to Him. The story continues that Elijah is so excited about the Lord's victory that he outruns a chariot to inform the King's court of the news. This must have been the best day of Elijah's life. The Lord is victorious.

Yet, on the way to the royal court, Elijah hears the news that instead of a national repentance and a turning to the Lord, people hardened their hearts against the Lord; and Jezebel, the queen, wants Elijah dead. We read on in 1 King 19 that Elijah goes from an eagerness to proclaim the victory of the Lord to running for his life and hiding. Elijah was so depressed that he actually prays to the Lord to let him die. 1 King 19:4-5 says "He came to a broom bush, sat down under it and prayed that he might die. "I have had enough, Lord," he said. "Take my life; I am no better than my ancestors." Then he lay down under the bush and fell asleep."

The day went from being the best day of Elijah's life to Elijah being so discouraged that he actually asks God to let him die. Why? The answer is that Elijah was so thoroughly discouraged by the hardness of people's hearts in spite of the manifold revelation of God's power upon Mt. Carmen.

The hardness of people's hearts is sometimes one of the most difficult things about serving the Lord. Everyday is filled with the beauty of His creation, or the power of His Word, or the love of His people.

Yet, despite what is seen or experienced, many people choose instead to continue in disobedience and blindness. People would rather criticize, disobev. complain foster a spirit of discontent instead of a spirit of thankfulness. It is hard to serve the Lord when people's hearts are hard. I imagine that this is how Elijah must have felt when he prayed to the Lord to let him die.

What makes this story so

powerful is how the Lord responds to Elijah. Reading from 1 King 19:6-21 the Lord cares for Elijah and responds to the Elijah's deepest needs.

- The Lord gives nourishment to Elijah ("take and eat for the journey is long" v.7).
- The Lord provides Elijah with His presence ("after the fire came a gentle whisper" v.12).
- The Lord reveals to Elijah His purpose and reminds Elijah that he is not alone. ("I reserve 7,000 of Israel" v. 18).
- The Lord strengthens Elijah with friendship ("Go and anoint Elisha" v.16).

In all of these things the Lord does not criticize Elijah but instead loves him and cares for Elijah's hurting heart. The Lord does the same for you and me.

The Lord has given to us all that we need to serve Him, even during times of disappointment, discouragement or depression. The Lord sustains us through His Word; the Lord renews our vision and purpose for His work; and the Lord provides the fellowship of believers. So pray to Him not as a last resort during times of discouragement, but as the first resort, and may the power and the glory of the Lord be revealed to you and in your life.

Church Family—It is time for Operation Christmas Child (OCC)

New Baptist has a goal of 300 boxes for OCC this year. AWANA will be able to fill 50 boxes, one for each child in AWANA to send to a child in another part of the world. If you would like to help us pack a box, some of the items needed are:

small hand towels

Wash clothes

Soap boxes

Soap

Toothbrushes

Ink pens

Pencils and sharpeners

T-shirts

Barrettes, hair ties

Small stuffed animals

Socks

Small cars

The most important part of a box is prayer, God will direct you with the items for your box and to whom that box should be received with prayer. In Sunday School we were recently challenged to LOVED offer a blessing over our children on a regular basis. This continues to stir in my mind. Not only do we see Esau distraught in Genesis 27 that Jacob stole his blessing from his father, it makes him so mad that he threatens to kill Jacob. I haven't experienced cases as extreme

as this, but I have seen both children and adults working tirelessly seeking the blessing or affirmation of someone. There is a blessing offered in Numbers 6 to the people of Israel that I think is a good reminder for us and one that we can pass along to our children to remind them who and whose they are.

"The Lord bless you and keep you.

The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you: The Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace."

Verse 27 says "So shall they put my name upon the people of Israel, and I will bless them." John repeatedly calls us "Children of God" in his gospel and letters, and as such, we carry God's name upon us and are able to receive his blessing. At the same time, we can pass that blessing along to our children, asking God to bless and keep them, showing them grace and peace. There are multiple blessings offered in scripture and so there is not just one way to offer a blessing to your children.

At a recent workshop, I offered this idea and had a number of pastors and parents share stories about receiving blessings from their parents or from grown children running back to them asking for a reminder that they are loved, known, and kept by both God and their families. Wow! What a wonderful gift to be thankful for: to know that the God of the universe knows you and loves you, and that your parents desire to remind you of that on a regular basis.

We build holidays into our November calendar in order to remind us that our freedom was not free and to create space to be thankful. Why not build reminders into our daily lives, providing space to be reminded that we are known and loved by a God who not only desires to rescue us but to bless us and keep us.

Praying that God will reveal Himself to you, that His presence will be made known to you and your family!

Food Pantry:



Our food pantry continues to amaze me with all they serve! The backpack weekend food given to Highlawn Elementary each week has increased from 50 to 60 totaling 420!

In August and September, they served 505 families totaling 1,164 people (370 children, 610 adults, 184 seniors) and 62 homeless. They were also able to distribute

125 hygiene kits.

Service Opportunities:

Operation Christmas Child:

Shoeboxes are due on Sunday Nov 11. We have set a goal of 300 boxes as a church. Make this a family event. Let your kids help do the shopping. Draw the child a picture and then let your kids pray for the child that will receive these boxes. This is more than just a shoebox. Each child that receives these boxes will also hear the Gospel. Each child is also given the opportunity to be involved in a discipleship training to learn more and grow deeper.

OCC also works with local churches to minister to these children long term. This is way more than a shoebox...it is a tool that is advancing the kingdom!

Branches Ministry:

Branches is a secret safe home for women who have left abusive situations. They are asking for donations of old cell phones and chargers. You simply need to remove your SIM card. You can drop donations at the mission display board and we will get it to them.

Marcum Terrace:

We will be serving a holiday dinner to the residents of Marcum Terrace on Sunday, November 18. This has been an ongoing tradition of NBC for many years. We are looking at this being the last year we serve this dinner there, but we are looking at other avenues to serve next year. From the Board of Finance

Starting this year, most of you will no longer be able to itemize deductions for federal income tax purposes. Instead, you will claim the standard deduction, and will not receive any additional tax benefit associated with your charitable contributions.

However, if you have a traditional IRA and are 70½ years old (the age you are required to take minimum distributions from your account), you can have the custodian of your IRA make a qualified charitable distribution (up to \$100,000 annually) directly to a qualified charity, such as New Baptist Church. You pay no federal or state tax on the qualified charitable distribution, and you still claim your full standard deduction amount in determining your federal income tax liability. (The amount of qualified distribution from your traditional IRA is excludible from your income. Your tax savings is your combined marginal federal and state income tax rates times the amount of the qualified charitable distribution.)

This information is not intended to be a substitute for specific individualized tax advice. You should discuss your specific tax situation with a qualified tax adviser to see whether this strategy makes sense for you.

Program: Let me see now: it is November, Halloween is history, Christmas is the future and November is the present and is the month we celebrate Thanksgiving. You recall Thanksgiving is the day that probably saw the "covered Dish" introduced on the entertainment scene and we celebrate the feast of the Pilgrims and the Native American Tribes. In November 1621 Governor William Bradford organized the feast celebrating the Pilgrim's successful corn harvest, which was a joint effort between the Pilgrims and the local Native American Tribes. If it had not been for the Native American Tribes showing the Pilgrims how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees and catch fish in the rivers, the pilgrims would not have survived the harsh New England winters that still exist today. In appreciation for the help of the Native American Tribes, he invited them to join the Pilgrims and give thanks for the successful harvest that will provide food thru the coming winter. There were 50 surviving Pilgrims and 90 members of the Wampanoag Tribe and their Chief Massasoit at the feast. Their meal was a little different than ours today. They did not have Butter Ball turkey, stuffing, cranberry sauce, candied sweet potatoes, mashed potatoes, hot yeast rolls, butter, broccoli casserole, half runner green beans, pumpkin pie and sweet tea. I did read somewhere that they did have a football game and the Kansas City Chiefs played the Washington Redskins. Just kiddin'. Our program this month will be provided by Dr. Bill Deel, who is retired from Marshall University. Dr. Deel has presented several of our programs and we have asked him to come back and talk to us about "Porches". He has an interesting observation about porches and how they can affect our everyday lives. The way things are today in the USA, I believe we could use a lot more porches which would give us a different outlook on the happenings around us. You won't want to miss this!!!!! We invite you to come out for this great time of food, fun and fellowship. We also hope you will invite a neighbor or two to come along with you.
